of the Learning Resource Center will be a half-dozen members from the local chapter of the Society for Creative Anach romain, Inc., which specializes in recreating events of the High Middle Ages.

Four or five men, including Osanna's Welsh husband from the 1400s, Roland d'Argentan (mundane name, Tim Aydt), will stage a fight in full suits of armor using rattan swords. As

Cool! WaterFurnace makes donation

WaterFurnace International has seen to that by donating a \$17,407 geothermal heating/cooling system. to the on-campus facility, which has been built entirely by private funding through the Rend Lake College Foundation thanks to generous donations by Marjorie Farrar, the late Coyn Mateer and others.

"No matter where you live, the underground temperature stays relatively constant all year," explained WaterFurnace Territory Manager Jeff Hurst. "Geothermal systems harness this relatively constant, safe, clean and infinitely renewable energy source and use it for heating, air conditioning and hot water."

The Premier 2 system installed in the Children's Center, according to Hirist, will provide lower operating costs (savings of 30 60% in most cases), quieter operation, a safer and cleaner mode of operation which means less dust and better indoor air quality and a more even distribution of warm air in the winter and central air with better dehumidification in

the summer. The system emits no CO2, which is considered a major contributor to environmental air pollution, and is more flexible than most in that all three components are produced by the same unit.

"Geothermal systems are extremely energy efficient, since they only need a comparably small amount of electricity to power the pump, compressor and fan. They typically deliver up to four times more energy than they consume, so the college should save significantly on its monthly energy bills," Hurst added.

"We greatly appreciate the generosity shown by WaterFurnace in support of Rend Lake College," commented RLC Foundation Executive Director Pat Mitchell. "Because of businesses like WaterFurnace International, we are able to offset costs of items such as this and raise more money for other student support.

"This will go a long way toward helping a students attend college who might not otherwise be able to do so, without the availability of quality day care for their child or children."

Rend Lake College students in the

Heating, Air Conditioning and Refrigeration program have been learning the technical side of geothermal systems since last fall as the result of an earlier donation from Tri-County Flectric Cooperative, Inc., and WaterLurnace Midwest - The Inc. based college was one of five down state - the only one south of Mattoon to receive the state-of-the-industry training system (valued at \$4,802) and technical assistance.

"We are sure Rend Lake College students and the community as a whole will benefit greatly from this latest equipment donation, in particular, and geothermal heating and cooling trasining, in general. We are very pleased, also, with the efforts of WaterFurnace to help this become a reality," Tri-County Electric Cooperative Director of Marketing Bruce Barkau said at the time, an omen of things to come.


The class will meet from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays at Pinckneyville Community Hospital.

with most fights, the primary purpose will be to defend one's honor and chivalry.

Aydt is a continuing student from McLeansboro. Herhusband is a Rend Lake College graduate who will be taking time off from his regular job in the Regional Office of Education.

Michael O'Brian, or "Bran," a retired high-rise construction worker from Thompsonville, will not be involved in the battle but will be on hand dressed in complete Middle Ages garb. He is typical of society members in that he has been involved with the organization since his college days.

A fifth-grade teacher from Cobden, Adrienne Will, is taking a personal day to help as well. Friend and foe alike in Roland's hand-tohand combat will come from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale, Osanna explained.

"The Society for Creative Anach-

ronism is a not-for-profit, family organization dedicated to the study of the Middle Ages," she continued. "It started in Berkeley (CA) in the mid '60s as entertainment for a backyard garden party and just snowballed from there. Today, there are several hundred-thousands of members. There is an (SCA) event somewhere across the world almost every week. Our members represent all types of people and professions."

Along with the fight, Osanna and friends will be presenting (displaying) some authentic weapons and armor from that era. Total armor for the foot soldiers would include steel helmets, protection for shoulders, torso and knees, gloves and a shield.

At larger demonstrations, such as one coming up in October, the group is likely to be showing archery, fencing, brewing, blacksmithing and sewing (embroidery), as well as Singing and story-telling.

"I'm in charge of all children's activities for our shire, which would include history, crafts and games for ages 2-12," Osanna commented.

The Southern Illinois group, comprised of several residents from Carbondale, McLeansboro and communities in between, will be staging a major event October 16-18, "A Boar Hunt" in celebration of the "Return of the Dragons" at Camp Ondessonk in the Shawnee National Forest. A highlight will be an elaborate, medieval feast with four "removes"

The Shire of Far Reaches meets monthly at 7 p.m. on the second Tuesday. The meeting place alternates between the Student Center on the Southern Illinois University-Carbondale campus and the Marion Carnegie Library.

"If there is enough interest," she added, "what I would love to do is get a group started here on campus."

RLC golfers repeat Logan title, claim second Fall crown

You never know which Rend Lake College golf team is going to show up.

Take the past weekend's John A. Logan Invitational, for example. Rend Lake College led after Saturday's 18 holes at Crab Orchard Country Club in Carterville. And Rend Lake College posted Sunday's best round over the more demanding Hickory Ridge Golf Course in Carbondale.

So what's the point?

The RLC quintet that led the first day was supposed to do just that, entering as a favorite along with Iowa powerhouse Indian Hills. Eighteen holes later, the RLC squad that won the tournament was not the same team. Literally.

What was expected to be Coach Dave Smith's second-best unit turned out to be the Logan Invitational's finest, utilizing a nifty, even-par 70-72–142 from newcomer Jeremy Reidelberger for a come-from-behind, 303-302–605 triumph to successfully defend the Rend Lake College championship in last fall's inaugural event.

Parkland College came down from Champaign to eke out a second-place trophy with its 301-310-611 four-player, 36-hole composite, just ahead of RLC No. 1 – or in this case, No. 3 – with a 300-312-612 scorecard. Transfer Danny Johnson fired a 72-75-147 to lead the RLC "Black" squad and claim fourth individually, two spots behind Reidelberger.

Indian Hills settled for fourth at 311-303-614 after one of its top players signed an incorrect card on Saturday and was disqualified despite a 71, while John A. Logan was fifth in its own meet with 301-314-615.

The 14-team field that played second-fiddle to the Rend Lakers also included Illinois Central, sixth at 305-

312–617; 7. Bevill State (AL), 305-315–620; 8. Illinois Valley, 307-315–622; 9. Rock Valley, 309-321–630; 10. Lewis & Clark, 309-322–631; 11. Black Hawk, 312-323–635; 12. John Wood, 336-324–660; 13. Southeastern Illinois, 334-333–667; 14. Prairie State, 337-330–667.

"I'm still trying to figure out who my top five players are," said a pleased-but-confused Smith, who had considered sophomore Chad Penman, freshman Zack Mayhew and transfer Danny Johnson in the top threesome, "but Reidelberger definitely belongs there. He was fourth (overall) at Freeport (in the season-opening Highland '36'), played pretty well at Champaign (Parkland Invitational) and is second here. That's pretty good."

Not to mention freshman Brian Kolmer, Reidelberger's teammate over the weekend and the fifth-place finisher overall with his 77-73–150, and soph Brandon Bullard, next at 74-77–151. Then there are two more veterans, Trent Hudgens and Jimmy Middleton, contributors on the 1998 spring contingent that took sixth in the nation in the NJCAA Division II Championships.

To save his par round and tournament, Reidelberger Sunday "made the best par I've seen in a long time on the last hole," his coach said. After recording birdies on the 16th and 17th holes, his second shot on the par-four 18th "blew over" the green and landed 25 yards away, in a trap on the No. 9 hole that backs up to the closing hole. But he got up and down from there in two, placing his recovery shot from the sand within five feet of the pin and then holing out.

Medalist Brian Stamerger of Illinois Valley was almost out-of-sight with his 30 on the front nine Saturday at Crab Orchard and his two-day total of 66-73–139. The only other outsider to crash RLC's 2-4-5 party was Bevill State's Eric Smith, third at 69-77–146.

Reidelberger (St. Charles, MO), Kolmer (Salem) and Bullard (Mt. Vernon) were complemented the first day by freshman T.J. Conner (Mt. Vernon), who finished with 82-82–164, and the final round by soph Jerrod Capps (Jerseyville/Calhoun County), with 83-80–163.

Weekend teammates of Johnson (BellevilleWest) included last spring's near-miss All-American and Spring "MVP" Penman (Brazil, IN, Northview), 73-79–152; the Parkland Invite fifth-place finisher and team leader, Mayhew (Carmel, IN), 77-78–155, and sophs Hudgens (West Frankfort) and Middleton (Nashville) at 80-80–160 and 78-85–163, respectively.

"Indian Hills might have won it without the disqualification, but then again we would have won it going away if I had put Reidelberger on my 'first five' as I probably should have," Smith noted. "But all that is beside the point. We have won it (Logan Invitational) both times, and we appreciate it."

Smith will not be taking two teams on an upcoming trip to Chicago for tournaments at Rock Valley (South Beloit Friday and Saturday) and DuPage (September 21) as he has been able to do the first three tournaments, but he is hoping to take a five-man team plus two individual entries.

"We may put a couple of new guys with the top five and see if they can play as well there as they have been playing. There is a difference, but it may not make that much difference to them. We'll see," commented Smith.

Parkland Invites provides first links win for Warriors

SAVOY – At times in the past, Rend Lake College golf teams have struggled more in the Parkland Invitational than in any other Midwest event.

Nowadays, apparently, the Rend Lakers are good enough to tease the opposition a little, faltering slightly down the homestretch but still having enough left to win the 20-team event played Thursday over the challenging, University of Illinois par-72 Orange Course.

Coach Dave Smith's squad recorded a four-player composite of 305 to finish one stroke ahead of both Sauk Valley and Champaign-based host Parkland. It was RLC's third Parkland Invitational title in the last four tries, improving on last fall's runner-up finish.

Freshman Zack Mayhew and sophomore Chad Penman, two Warriors with Hoosier roots (Carmel and Brazil, respectively), headed the winning charge.

Mayhew, who had the fifth-best score on a five-man team in his collegiate debut, shot 36-38-74 this time, tied for fourth overall in the medalist race and good for fifth in a scorecard playoff. Penman's story is almost identical ... a near-miss All-America qualifier at last spring's NJCAA Division II Championships, he opened the 1998 fall campaign with the squad's highest score but rebounded in the second tourney with his 38-37-75

They were joined in the winning effort by transfer Danny Johnson (Belleville West) and veteran Jimmy Middleton (Nashville), both at 40-38–78. Johnson, by way of Wallace-Dothan (AL), posted the team's top mark in the Highland "36," while Middleton played alongside Penman and fellow returnee Trent Hudgens (West Frankfort) in last season's finals. Freshman Brian Kolmer (Salem) checked in at 40-41–81.

A split squad also placed sixth for Rend Lake College at 313, behind fourth-place Danville Area at 312 and Lincoln "Silver," also at 313 but a notch ahead due to fifth-man scoring. That RLC contingent put together a 37-39-76 from Hudgens, a 41-36-77 from freshman Jeremy Reidelberger (St. Charles, MO), 80s from former Mt. Vernon Township High School teammates Brandon Bullard, a soph at 42-38, and T.J. Conner, a freshman at 40-40, and the 44-41-85 for soph Jerrod Capps (Jerseyville/Calhoun County).

Although Southern Illinois rival John A. Logan sent only one team — and not all of its top players — it obviously sent the right one. Southeast Missouri State transfer Dan Parker claimed medalisat honors for the Vols with his two-under 18-hole total of 70, two shots better than runner-up Mike Sebastiani of Parkland. Brent Davis of Southeastern Illinois and DACC's Tony Tiernan slipped in ahead of Mayhew with a 72 and 74, respectively.

Smith let qualifying rounds during practice sort out the two teams for the Parkland Invite. Prior to the Highland "36" August 28, he went basically with freshman and sophomore squads, with some exception, and was surprised with a second-place showing from the youngsters and a fourth

from the vets.

The winners almost let things get away, unbeknownst at the time. Mayhew's only real mistake all day was a double-bogey on his 16th hole. Penman waited until his last hole to knock the ball out of bounds; he, too, settled for a double-bogey. But neither proved fatal team-wise, although they did drop in the individual race as a result.

The triumph over spotty fairways hardened by a lack of rain on an otherwise gorgeous day was "nice," Smith conceded. "It helps. We'll see how they do this weekend. Then were off on a five-day Chicago trip that should sort things out for us even more."



Dear SURS Employer:

Over the years, we have all seen our organizations grow and change. The pace you keep on a day to day basis and the things you accomplish are almost unbelievable. Yet, as we continue to provide more, still more is needed from all of us.

The employees of the State Universities Retirement System are finding themselves at this crossroads. Members of the system are continuing to retire younger, retirees are living longer and the need for all our services has greatly expanded.

This is good news. It means that higher education in Illinois is doing well and the system is thriving. But, it also means we have had to take a close look at the services we provide to determine where we find the greatest needs and what our capabilities are to provide them.

We believe we owe our members who are within one year of retirement or who have just retired, priority service. To help meet this goal, we find that SURS must place some criteria around the estimate and counseling requests that we produce for members.

In the following situations, we will provide up to 2 estimates, if the member:

- --is retiring before 9/1/99
- --must decide on the value of a potential service credit purchase
- --is divorcing
- --must sign an employment agreement before 9/1/99

In addition, SURS will be able to provide appointments and field service counseling for those members who are retiring within the year, on a limited basis. Those members who meet the above criteria will be scheduled for appointments as our schedule permits.

Current benefit estimate requests on file with SURS will be completed if those members meet the newly established criteria as listed above. Members whose requests fall outside these guidelines will receive a letter from SURS which explains this policy.

If a member is not retiring within the current academic year, and needs an estimate, SURS recommends the following resources which are available for them to use:

1. SURS Web Site

Located at www.surs.com. This web site contains a benefit estimator. The member will need the information contained in their 1997 Benefit Summary Statement to project an accurate benefit amount.

2. 1998 Benefit Summary Statement

Members should receive this annual update by mid November of 1998.

3. General Formula Table

A member may compute this calculation and apply it to their own situation fairly easily. Multiply each year of service by 2.2%. Then multiply that percentage by the average of the highest consecutive four years of earnings. This result will be the estimated annual benefit amount.

We believe that these new policies will allow us to make the most effective use of the staff, systems and other resources that are available to us. As always, we appreciate your help as we strive to meet the needs of our membership.



High-tech teaching

Colleges are betting that wired classrooms help students learn

hen the 10 Mount Holyoke College students in Prof. Robert Schwartz's history class studied Mary Shelley's Frankenstein last spring, they followed the lead of the novel's famous scientist. They harnessed the latest technology-in their case, searching the Internet for music, poetry, and paintings about nature from the Romantic period—to stitch together their own final creation, a multimedia CD-ROM.

Schwartz's course is part of a broad experiment underway in higher education. At institutions around the country, professors and administrators are using computers and related technologies to help students learn about everything from high-energy physics to the works of German poet Rainer Maria Rilke. According to a survey conducted in 1997 by the California-based Campus Computing Project, almost one third of all college courses now make use of E-mail, up from

8 percent in 1994, and a quarter of all classes draw on the Internet. Some find these statistics encouraging, others worrisome, but there's no question that universities and colleges are embracing information technology. According to Kenneth Green, director of the Campus Computing Project, "Information technology has become an increasingly important component of the instructional and learning experience, across all fields and all types of institutions."

Big investors. The most common investment that schools have made in new technology over the past decade has been wiring-installing computer connections not just in computer labs but in dorm rooms and snack bars. It's not unusual today for freshmen to receive an Internet account along with their ID card. But some schools have gone further. For example: A handful of schools now require all incoming students to have a laptop, which they can plug into hundreds of power

versity of Minnesota-Crookston became the first to institute this requirement. Most recently, Wake Forest University in North Carolina raised its tuition by \$3,000 to \$19,450 annually to cover a major investment in new technology, including laptops for all incoming freshmen.

■ A number of schools are encouraging students and professors to create their own Web sites. At the University of California-Los Angeles, for example, a technical staff will construct a Web site free of charge for any student who wants one.

Enthusiasts for higher education's "technology revolution" say getting students wired is well worth the often considerable expense. The primary benefit, says Chancellor Donald Sargeant of the University of Minnesota-Crookston, is that students acquire the technological savvy they will need for many jobs in the 21st century.

Other professors who have taken to new technologies say that their courses have become more dynamic as a result; many have abandoned textbooks altogether, opting instead to put course materials on the Web. Says philosophy Prof. Tad Beckman of Harvey Mudd College: "[A Web site] is a 'living text,' You never have to finish working on it." Beckman and others also say that Web publication of course notes allows teachers to spend less class time lecturing and to devote more time to discussion.

When students are connected electronically, such discussions can continue beyoud the classroom walls, say advocates. At Wake Forest, for example, students are encouraged to use their laptops to E-mail professors (and fellow students) whenever a question or comment occurs to them. whether right after class or in the middle of the night.

The main question about high-tech education is whether computers actually enhance learning. Anecdotal evidence points around campus. In 1993, the Uni- | from both professors and students sug-

gests that classroom technology may help students engage with the course material. Says 22-year-old Elizabeth Beede, one of the students in the Mount Holyoke Frankenstein class: "Producing a CD-ROM keeps you excited. We found ourselves working late into the night." But few systematic studies have been carried out, and those that exist are too limited to be conclusive.

The lack of hard data doesn't keep technological enthusiasts from talking about notions such as "hypertext thinking style"—a more fluid cognitive style that is said to come from following the intellectual linkages of the Web rather than traditional research methods. But it's not clear that computers lead to different, let alone deeper, thinking styles, argues Stephen Kerr, a sociologist at the University of Washington and author of

Technology in the Future of Schooling.

Critics also argue that there are risks associated with higher ed's infatuation with computer technology. Some say that while there is nothing wrong with multimedia, professors who often assign students technological projects may be sidestepping the difficult job of teaching students to write clearly and argue rigorously. Kerr is also concerned about the trend of substituting materials on the Internet for textbooks: "Textbooks represent consensus on limited, exemplary materials, the fundamentals of a discipline."

At the extreme, students can become addicted to computers, much as some become dependent on drugs. According to psychologist Kimberly Young, author of Caught in the Net, about 8 to 14 percent of college students become addicted to Internet use. Some spend up to 80 hours

a week in chat rooms and "MUDding"—playing a kind of Internet fantasy game, with a predictable effect on their academic performance. Two years ago, officials at Alfred University in New York became alarmed when they found that nearly double the normal number of students were failing academically. They discovered that 42 percent of those failing were often staying up late at night on the Internet. The university now offers counseling and a seminar warning of the dangers of Internet addiction.


Officials at Alfred University and elsewhere are increasingly aware that the new technologies, if not properly handled, may severely undermine the learning they were harnessed to enhance. That's a bleak vision of technology's potential, but one Mary Shelley would have appreciated.

Notebook computers go to college

ot long ago, the question, "What kind of computer should I take to college?" had one correct answer: a Mac, of course. But today, Macintosh computers command less than 5 percent of the education market, down from almost 24 percent just four years ago. Some colleges and universities-most recently Yale and the University of North Carolina-have expressly requested that freshmen not bring Macs along.

Apple has lost its foothold in part because PCs are cheaper and because college students need the kinds of office applications that abound for PCs. "Macintosh's dominance in education was as the platform of choice for educational software, but once students get to college, they're not using those programs anymore," says Roger Kay, an analyst of education technology for the research firm IDC. College computing requires word processors,

spreadsheets, databases, Email, and Web browsers.

A desktop may not suffice, however. A growing number of schools encourage students to bring notebook computers instead. "There's a recognition that students are nomads," says David G. Brown, provost of Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C. "Colleges are utilizing computers in the laboratories and in studygroup sessions and, to a more limited extent, during class sessions." Some "notebook universities," as they call themselves, require a portable with specific minimum features: typically, a system running Windows 95 with a Pentium-class 133-MHz processor, 16 megabytes of RAM, and a CD-ROM drive.

Popular models. To lower the cost to students of notebooks, which can be twice as expensive as desktops, many schools have introduced leasing programs. Meanwhile, for those who can afford to buy one, prices are dropping. A relatively powerful notebook computer, with a 166-MHz Pentium-class processor, 16 megabytes of RAM, a 2-gigabyte hard drive, a CD-ROM drive, and a 12-inch ac-

tive matrix screen (which conserves battery life), is now about \$1,600. The most popular models on campus are IBM's ThinkPad, Dell's Inspiron and Latitude (available by mail at www.dell .com), and the Compaq Presario and Armada.


At many schools, a leased notebook comes equipped with a network adapter card, which permits a direct, highspeed connection to the college's academic network from the dorm room, as well as to the Internet. (Students who buy their own computers should expect to pay about \$130 for a portable-or, in tech-talk, PCMCIA-network card.) If a school does not provide high-speed access to the network, an extra phone line will probably be needed for extended logons, as well as a fast, portable modem. You can expect to pay \$130 to \$200 for a 56-kbps (kilobits per second) PCMCIA modem, which fits into an open slot on the notebook.

Assuming it is treated respectfully (no coffee or ashtrays tipped into the keyboard during cram fests), a notebook should be reaching the end of its life cycle just as commencement nears.
