Fall Region XXIV 5 = Spring NJCAAs

SPRINGFIELD - It was survival of the fittest for the Region XXIV Golf Championships Saturday, and for the fifth year in a row that was good news for the pre-eminent team, the Rend Lake College Warriors.

Coach Dave Smith's club braved howling, 40-mile-perhour winds to advance to next spring's NJCAA Division II National Championships with a 610 team total, six shots ahead of runner-up Parkland and seven better than John A. Logan.

The Warrior four-player composite of 315 at The Rail Golf Course on Saturday was 20 strokes higher than its opening 18 on Friday, but on a day when players were constantly having to back away from their shot until the winds died down, it was good enough. Parkland was another three back, just as it had been at the halfway point.

Only Logan, with sophomore medalist Brad Dunker leading the charge, made up any ground with its 304-313-617 total. Dunker overcame the elements for a three-over par 75 and 36-hole total of 148.

RLC freshman Brian Kolmer (Salem) and transfer Danny Johnson (Belleville West) finished second and fourth individually to spearhead the winning charge, but it was the improved play Saturday of national tournament veteran Chad Penman (Brazil, IN, Northview) and another freshman, Zack Mayhew (Carmel, IN), that helped maintain the winning advantage.

77s despite "brutal" playing conditions. Penman improved five strokes over the score he posted under ideal conditions 24 hours earlier with his 38-39 round, while Mayhew followed Friday's 78 with his 39-38 score against the wind.

All-Region XXIV honorees Kolmer (41-39–80) and Johnson (40-41–81) trailed for the day but finished at 149 and 153 for the two-day event. Kolmer's three-under 69 had given him a three-shot edge over Johnson starting second-round action.

Rend Lake College sophomore Brandon Bullard (Mt. Vernon) fired a 76 Friday but did not figure in the four-player scoring on Saturday with his 39-43–82.

Only the winning team advances to the NJCAA finals from the 10-team Midwest regional, along with the top five individuals who are not members of the championship squad. The NJCAA showdown will be held June 1-4 at the new Riverwood layout in Clayton, NC.

After making Smith Region XXIV "Coach of the Year" the last four falls, the Warriors have finished second, third, fifth and sixth, in that order. Tyler (TX) Junior College has won the Division II crown the past five seasons.

In addition to Dunker, the national contingent from Region XXIV will include third-place Mike Sebastiani of Parkland (75-76–151) and half of

the six-man playoff to break the deadlock at 154 — playoff winner Chris Drake (78-76) of John Wood thanks to a birdie on the first extra hole, Josh Bradbury of Illinois Central (77-77) and Parkland's Nick Finson (76-78). Failing to gain a spot in the finals were Parkland's Justin Vanlanduit (75-79), Southeastern Illinois' Justin Patton (75-79) and Danville Area's Casey Cartwright (77-77).

"Five in a row has never been done," Smith explained. "Illinois Central advanced four straight times back when there weren't any other teams competing in Division III, but this is the first time a team has won five straight.

"It was close to the very end. We were never able to put it away until the very end. For us to shoot a score that high, it had to be pretty tough out there. The wind was bending the trees over out there. At the finish, Parkland would put one in the water, and then we'd put one in the water. It was a struggle just to keep yourself from bleeding to death.

"Sebastiani birdied 15 and was looking pretty good, but he hit it in the water at 16. Then DJ (Johnson) hit it in the water twice for us. They both had 6s on a par-3 hole, and then both birdied No. 17.

Kolmer was five-over par on the front nine Saturday. He parred the last seven holes, but it was not quite

enough to catch Dunker and regain the lead. "Second isn't bad, especially for a freshman. He did good," Smith said.

"They all came through again under some difficult circumstances. We are already looking forward to making the trip next spring to the national tournament. That's a good deal."

Smith & Co. won seven of the nine fall tournaments. The team did not lose to an Illinois opponent, however. They lost to Indian Hills (IA) in the season opener, the Highland "36," rattled off six straight wins and then slipped to third behind guests Tyler and Indian Hills in last weekend's Rend Lake College Invitational.

Kolmer's 69 helps Warriors to 3-shot lead after 18

SPRINGFIELD – Four-time defending champion Rend Lake College is in the driver's seat at the half-way point of the Region XXIV Golf Championships, but there is little margin for error despite a three-under par 69 from individual pacesetter Brian Kolmer and an even-par round from Danny Johnson.

Backseat driver Parkland is breathing down the RLC necks, trailing by a mere three stokes with 18 holes to play Saturday at The Rail Golf Course.

Coach Dave Smith's perennial fa-

vorites finished Friday's opening 18 with a four-player composite of 295, compared to the 298 from Parkland, with Mike Greenwood matching Johnson's 72 tally, and third-place John A. Logan at 304 thanks to a 73 by Brad Dunker and 74 by Dan Parker.

Kolmer dominated the front nine with four birdies and a score of 32. In fact, he was six-under after 12 holes, then had to steady himself with pars the final four holes after a near-disaster – a bogey on No. 13 and a double-bogey on the 14th when he knocked


his drive out-of-bounds.

Johnson would have been under par and in second alone had it not been for a bogey on No. 18 to finish at 36-36–72, while Greenwood was finishing at 34-38–72.

They were followed in the RLC pecking order by surprise No. 3 man Brandon Bullard and freshman Zack Mayhew. Bullard, the soph who replaced Lincoln Invite medalist and two-time fall runner-up Jeremy Reidelberger in the top five, shot 38-38-76, and Mayhew was at 40-38-78.



Cultural diversity offered in spring


An "Intercultural Communication" class that meets state mandates for cultural diversity of the curriculum and training for faculty will be offered in an accelerated format this spring.

Call to Order. Terry Wilkerson called the meeting to order.

Constitution Housekeeping. Terry asked for a motion to give Becky permission to do some housekeeping on the constitution. "Vice President" needs to be changed to "Dean of Instruction." Julie suggested that it be Chief Academic Officer.

Steve Kennett made a motion to change "Vice President" in the constitution to "Chief Academic Officer." Ro Hoar seconded the motion. There was no discussion. The motion passed.

Service Learning. Rex Duncan distributed a handout on service learning. The Illinois Campus Compact for Community Colleges is offering faculty scholarships. The scholarship could be a stipend or money for expenses (conferences or materials). RLC is in the process of creating an instructional service learning program. We will have a pool of money available on campus. We might like something that the Illinois Campus Compact doesn't like.

Some examples of service learning we have had on campus are:

- 1. Debbie Benns did a community nursing course, and its goal was for students to learn about the role of nursing in community health issues.
- 2. The American Lung Association provided Mr. Gross Mouth to 25 different schools in the area.
- 3. John Fisher's Chemistry 1104 class worked with Ewing Grade School. They went to Rend Lake and took water samples. They then went on shore and used a portable lab to test the water.

Rex reported that RLC has set an aggressive goal that by 2004 every student that graduates with an AA, AS or AAS has got to have two service learning courses, one in general education and one in their discipline. We will have to have faculty's help and participation. Rex stated that he had tried to find courses that did not apply to service learning, and he had found very few.

Rex announced a volunteerism conference on October 21. It can be used for salary schedule movement, and only costs \$15. The Executive Director of the Illinois Campus Compact will be speaking.

Rex advised that service learning classes will be identified by their section number, and Rex will work with the Counseling Department.

John Fisher said one of his students would always turn red when asked a question in class and would not participate, but that student turned out to be the best student at the lake.

Julie Meents advised that service learning probably needs to go into faculty development.

Rex has information on what other colleges are doing for service learning, and everyone is welcome to look at the material.

Rex announced that December 4 is the projected application date for scholarships.

<u>Faculty Development Committee Report.</u> Terry reported that the committee had met. The members are Debbie Benns, John Fisher, Ro Hoar, Joe Rust, Terry Wilkerson, and Julie Meents. Terry advised he had invited Wilanna Kiefer-Patton to be on the committee to represent the department chairs. Joe Rust is the committee's chairman.

Joe reported that the plan presented last year was rejected, so the committee is going back to Step 1. The plan was refused for several legitimate reasons, such as it was too narrow and didn't allow for change.

Joe recommended the committee be expanded again so all areas of the college have representation. This would be an ad hoc committee. The three areas not represented on the committee are Industrial Tech, Business and Social Science, and Health & P.F.

Joe gave the example that Terry Wilkerson was the newest hire, and the committee needs a cross section of people in different parts of the salary schedule and different parts of their career.

Joe suggested perhaps a focus group for part-time instructors. Before he came to the meeting he had looked at all documents. We don't do the seven items listed in the Academic Council's constitution. The Academic Council needs to review that section of the constitution. Joe said there may be a definition problem between faculty development and professional development. Joe said he defines professional development as being more broad than faculty development.

There was no change in the union contract language, and Section 16A deals with faculty development. There is a brief comment in the Faculty Handbook, 1.19, regarding faculty development.

Joe advised that if the committee is allowed to expand, they will look at everything already approved and start the process again.

Ro Hoar made a motion to keep the committee as is and add a representative from the other three departments to come to the meetings, and take part in the process. After some discussion, Ro rescinded her motion.

Ro Hoar made a recommendation to the council chair that there be an ad hoc committee made up of the standing committee plus representatives from other departments.

Terry Wilkerson said he would take the recommendation under advisement.

<u>Lakota Sioux.</u> Steve Kennett announced there would be a Lakota Sioux dance group on campus Sunday, October 18, at 3 P.M. He requested that everyone mention it in their classes. It is free and lasts about one hour.

Academic Computing Committee. Terry advised that at the meeting in May a motion was made to have a standing committee. To properly make a change in the constitution, a written request has to be submitted two weeks prior to the next Academic Council meeting. The motion has to be voted on by the council for two consecutive meetings, with a two-thirds majority of the quorum approving the motion at each meeting. If the motion does not get a two-thirds vote at the first meeting it is dead. If it does not pass, it can be brought up again.

Terry read Ro Hoar's memo for an Academic Computing Committee, and accepted it as a motion. It read as follows:

September 10, 1998

To Terry Wilkerson, President of the Academic Council:

According to the Constitution, which can be found in the full-time faculty handbook in Section VIII, an amendment to establish a new standing committee must be proposed in a written statement two weeks prior to the next Academic Council meeting. Then the Council must take a vote at two consecutive meetings with two-thirds voting assent for the amendment.

Therefore, I am requesting a change to the Constitution to include a standing Academic Computing Committee which would consist of academic personnel who would be interested in running and serving on this committee.

Since we did not follow the correct protocol last May 5, 1998, please consider this a formal proposal for the amendment.

Ro Hoar

Terry asked for a second to the motion. Larry Williams seconded the motion.

There was considerable discussion regarding the committee. Larry Williams asked how the committee would be different than the MIS committee. Lynn Nimtz indicated it would address academic problems that the MIS committee cannot and does not address. It could address software problems, problems with advisors not having equipment, not having enough IP addresses.

Lynn said she thought there was a misunderstanding about what we had in mind. It is not who gets what and what price. Faculty members need to get input in the direction that RLC goes. The committee could address concerns when labs change to new computers and scheduling issues. The faculty needs to be advised of changes. The committee would not be concerned with the allocation of resources. Lynn asked why it couldn't be a committee that plans for the future, looks at how we use technology in the future, and looks at problems before they happen. It would look at planning but not resources. Lynn indicated the MIS committee is administration driven. This committee would be faculty.

Steve Kennett said some things we will have to look at are access to the Internet, inventory, and copyright ownership.

Larry Williams reported that when the MIS Committee decided to update Tech 178, the department was not advised and no math software would run on it. Perhaps a committee would help.

Rob Little said he thought it was a problem of communication, and felt there should be an Academic Council committee.

Terry asked for a vote. The vote was: yes-7, no-5. The motion did not receive the necessary two-thirds majority to pass. The matter may be brought up to the committee again.

Note for Clarification. There were 12 people at the meeting eligible to vote. Tim Wills left before the vote, so that left 11 eligible to vote. Ro Hoar advised she had Vickie Lewis' proxy vote. Ms. Lewis also called the council secretary and advised her she had given her proxy vote to Ms. Hoar. The 11 present plus Ms. Lewis made a total of 12 eligible to vote. A two-thirds majority would be 8.



Auction to benefit students

Some students find financial asdistance through grants, loans and scholarships or work, but how many would turn to the student sit-ling next to them in class and ask for help paying their tuition bill?

For the students involved in the Rend Lake College Art League, that is exactly what is being done for the third year in a row.

"Students, RLC award-winning art Instructors Sara Capps and Therese Howard, past graduates and friends of the department do-nate original art work which will be auctioned at 8 pm. Saturday at the Rend Lake Resort Convention Center. The "Students For Stu-dents Art Auction" each fall is de-signed to generate scholarships for art students.

"This is entirely a student opera-tion," said Art League sponsor Therese Howard. "The students do-nate a majority of the art being anctioned off, they organize the anction and the students receive the "cholarships." I don't know of any other campus organization that supports each other in such a way."

The Art League was founded three years ago when a group of students learned that there were no scholarships offered to act stu-dents who wished to continue their studies for a second year at the community college.

"The students got together and discussed ways to solve the problem, not for just that one year, but for many years, and the idea of a yearly auction came up," Howard said. "It was important to them that they be offered the opportunity to generate their own money to show how much they believed in each other and in the art rogram. I each other and in the art program. I believe that is one of the reasons why this event has become so pop-ular for our students."

In the last two years, the Art League has raised about \$7,000 with the anctions and has awarded 14 scholarships.

Lest year, Mount Vernon native Sara Scott, who also serves as the Art League chaliperson for this auction, received one of the schol-arships so that she could return to school for a second year.

"I had some financial aid, but it really wasn't enough," Scott said. "When I first learned about the auction and the scholarship I didn't really believe it, I mean, a bunch of students donating their art work to be sold at auction and all the money goes into a big pot so that it can be given out in scholarships. I'd never heard of anything like that being done before

Scott said she feels that the tra-dition must continue.

"Some of the students who organized the first auction still do-nate work," she said. "They believed in each other as artists, as friends and colleagues, and they weren't afraid to put their work where their months were. I like that.

"I plan to donate next year after I'm of SIU. It is something that I want to be part of for a long, long time, as long as there are students
