

Census 'testing' Nov. 20; RLC can help

The United States Census Bureau will conduct more testing at Rend Lake College Friday, November 20, for those individuals interested in helping with the 2000 Census. Applicants may test at 10 a.m. or 2 p.m. in the Science Building, Room 110.

Over 400 people will be hired in Southern Illinois during the months leading up to the census for work as enumerators, crew leaders and clerks throughout the region. Testing also is scheduled for Friday, December 11, on the RLC campus in Ina.

The Census Bureau is looking for persons who want to earn money while they serve their communities. Several openings exist in Franklin County. Retirees, participants in government programs and the unemployed or underemployed are urged to apply.

Census enumerators are paid \$7.25 per hour plus \$.31 per mile for the use of their automobiles.

Applicants should be 18 years of age or older and U.S. citizens. Those planning on taking the test will need to bring their driver's license, Social Security card and three personal and three business references.

Interested in applying but worried about the test? Rend Lake College, through the Adult Education and Job Placement programs, will offer a series of CENSUS PREP courses in Benton designed to increase a person's test scores ... The higher your score, the better chance you have of getting hired and being considered for advanced positions.

CENSUS PREP will be free. The program is specifically designed to address the topics included on the Census Field Employee Selection-Aid Test, which evaluates applicants for work as Census Enumerators, Crew Leaders and Clerks. Topics include:

While taking CENSUS PREP training cannot guarantee employment with the Census Bureau, it can help prepare the prospect for the test with hopes of higher test scores.

Rex Duncan, Director of Cooperative Education and Job Placement at Rend Lake College, commented, "We had great success with a similar program with the Department of Corrections."

"We are very excited to be offering CENSUS PREP," added Linda Cox, coordinator of the college's Adult Education Program. "The Census people are telling us that recruitment has been a problem in Franklin County. We want to help Franklin County residents get these jobs. Our experience with Corrections was so positive that we look forward to expanding that concept of test preparation to the Census."

Off-campus testing, registration

Rend Lake College personnel will visit four off-campus sites November 9-12 to administer assessment testing in preparation for Spring Semester '99 and special registrations the following week.

The assessment testing schedule puts RLC representatives in Mt. Vernon on Monday, November 9, at the Times Square Campus in the newly remodeled Mt. Vernon mall; at Benton Consolidated High School on Tuesday, November 10, and at both Pinckneyville Community High School and the McLeansboro Family Resource Center on Thursday, November 12.

Who should take the test? Anyone

who plans on signing up for a college credit mathematics or English course, or as many as 12 credit hours, must take either the computerized COMPASS test or ASSET, unless he or she already has taken the college preparatory ACT exam and met minimum levels of scores in English (20), reading (20) and math (22).

There is no charge to take the assessment test, which also is given on a regular basis on the RLC campus - Mondays at 8:30 a.m., Wednesdays at 1 p.m. and Fridays at 8:30 a.m. in the Counseling Center – plus other designated times prior to the start of a new semester.

Test results are valid for four years. Students are allowed to repeat testing once.

Special Off-Campus Registrations are set for the week of November 16-19. RLC counselors and other advisors will return to Mt. Vernon on Monday, November 16, between 3 and 7 p.m. at Times Square Campus; Benton from 5-7 p.m. at the high school on Tuesday, November 17; Pinckneyville from 5-7 p.m. at the high school on Wednesday, November 18, and McLeansboro from 5-7 p.m. at the Family Resource Center on Thursday, November 19.

The Illinois Campus Compact for Community Service has announced availability of the Scholarship of Engagement (SOE) mini-grants.


These grants have been used successfully at Rend Lake College in the past to integrate service learning into currently existing courses.

Special recognition was given to two donors.

Also honored were B.J. Jacob and the Rend Lake Resort's John Reilly, on behalf of the newly established Larry Jacob Memorial Scholarship. Larry Jacob was a Springfield official who had developed a sincere concern for the college through his friendship with Reilly, ex-Capital Development Board executive and current lobbyist George Fleischli and Kern; the scholarship was established in his honor following his unexpected death recently.

Student recipient Bryce James of Mt. Vernon and his father, Steve James, were at the dinner to thank Jacob's widow, B.J. Jacob, and others for their generous gift.

"Bankers are always concerned with getting a good return on our investments," explained Flanigan, a former RLC Foundation Board member. "Needless to say, we consider making a donation to students at Rend Lake College, from an investment standpoint, second to none."

Flanigan alluded to the fact Rend Lake College has continued to change with the times and the needs of the community.

"They are always there to train people – as General Tire and others can attest to – so we are always proud to support a college that supports the local economy," he said. "Whatever the need, Rend Lake College has always been there for the community."

Individual students who had the opportunity to personally thank their scholarship benefactors from the podium Thursday night included RLC graduate Jodi Williams of Sesser and Jared Berry of Mt. Vernon.

Williams is the first recipient of the Fornier Family Scholarship, presented by a Sesser family for a Rend Lake College graduate attending Southern Illinois University-Carbondale. "It means a whole lot less worry because I don't worry as much about the money part," she noted.

Berry is one of three students receiving a Continental A.G., General Tire and GTY Tire Scholarship for family members of the local industry. Berry had worked a full-time job and two part-time jobs the past summer, "So you can imagine how I felt when I got the scholarship," he told those present. "Now I can concentrate more on my education."

Nervous when first approached about speaking, Berry did so willingly "when I realized what a great opportunity this is to express my thanks to General Tire." Berry's family accompanied him, along with the new GT Mt. Vernon Plant Manager, Denis Garvey, and Human Resources Manager Mark Pitchford.

Former student Peggy Ellerbusch of Mt. Vernon indicated much the same. "Oh, no," was her first reaction, "but they said it was to help honor Doris Welch, and I immediately said I'd be there."

Welch was a hospital patient several years ago when she first became aware of the "very good care she was receiving from Rend Lake College nursing students." That eventually led to the establishment of the Doris Welch Endowed Nursing Scholarship, of which Ellerbusch was a former recipient, and Julie Drew of McLeansboro, the current one.

Ellerbusch was a nontraditional student, married and working, when she first took one Anatomy and Physiology course, then "got up the nerve to enroll in the part-time Practical Nursing program."

But the Associate Degree Nursing program seemed out of the question, because it would have meant giving up needed family income.

"I talked to my husband about it, and prayed about it, but I finally gave up and realized my being an R.N. was just not meant to be," commented Ellerbusch. "Fortunately, my employer was willing to work with me to schedule around my classes, but unfortunately, I didn't know how I was going to get by on a part-time income and having to pay for college.

"And then the letter came unexpectedly from Rend Lake College saying I was the recipient of the Doris Welch Nursing Scholarship. The first thing I did was check the envelope to make sure it was sent to the right person."

It was sent to the right person, all right. Today, Ellerbusch and Welch, who splits her time between Mt. Vernon and Carmi, are lifelong friends.

"She didn't just send a note. She did something to help change lives," Ellerbusch noted, adding, "Thank you, Doris."

Kern recalled something his father used to preach to him ... that an education "is one thing you are given that can never be taken away."

Addressing the donors, and citing statistics that show 80% of the jobs in this country will require an education beyond the high school level by the year 2000, Kern commented:

"In some cases, you've made it (higher education) possible. In other cases, you've made it easier."

That will remain the primary concern. "The Rend Lake College Foundation sees student scholarships as its No. 1 priority and will continue to do so," Mitchell said.



REND LAKE COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES - NOVEMBER 10 MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Tax levy payable in 1999 represents 4.04% increase

Adopted the 1998 Tax Levy (payable in 1999) at \$3,295,043, which represents a 4.04% increase over the previous year. The total includes \$2,028,767 for Corporate and Special Purposes, \$1,266,276 for Debt Service.

Board Room named in honor of Curtis A. Parker

Approved naming the Executive Board Room, located in the Student Center, to the "Curtis A. Parker Board Room," in honor of the Mt. Vernon optometrist who was active on the original college steering committee, which was responsible for the formation of Rend Lake College by an overwhelming 8:1 vote in favor; served as the first chairman of the Rend Lake College District 521 Board, and has continued to be a strong supporter of the college long after his retirement as a Trustee.

RLC Organizational Chart revised

Approved a revised Administrative Procedure regarding a new Rend Lake College Organizational Chart which more accurately reflects the present structure of the college. Toplevel administrative duties, below the President, will be shared by the Dean of Instruction, Vocational Dean, Dean of Student Services and Dean of Finance.

Timetables for Upcoming Projects

Board members were advised of two project timetables:

- Bid will be open for the construction project on the North Access Road February 18, with construction beginning by April 1. Tentative completion date is July 1. RLC plans to bid separately, but at the same time, for parking near the North Oasis and by the South entrance parking lot.
- Intake Center construction and remodeling will begin February 1, with Phase I completed by August 1. Construction of Phase II is scheduled August 5-November 5; Phase III next November 7, with completion by January 7, 2000.

No recommendation yet on two positions

The administration was not ready to make a recommendation for two other positions on the agenda — Pinckneyville Correctional Center Youthful Offender Program Counselor and Distance Learning/Instructional Technology Specialist.

Title, job description change for Feira

Changed Dorothy Feira's title from Assistant Manager of the Bookstore to Coordinator of Textbook Sales and Rental. Her new job description, which was approved, increases responsibility and accountability. Recent implementation of the textbook rental program was cited for making the change, which will allow for a more efficient operation and higher level of service. Also changed the job description of Bookstore Manager to that of Manager - Retail Store.

Permission to Advertise Internally

Authorized the administration to advertise internally for:

- Executive Director of Community Development, a new, nontenure-track position with an annual salary of \$48,000-\$51,000. Because the new organizational structure of the college administration includes a new department, this position became necessary. This person will supervise existing and new projects regarding community development.
- Child Care Resource and Referral Financial Assistant, a nontenure-track position at an annual salary of \$24-\$26,000. The grantor has given additional funding for a full-time staff member, increasing from 3.5 to 4.5 full-time staff positions.

November is Career Development Month

Governor Jim Edgar has proclaimed November as Career Development month for the state of Illinois. This designation coincides with National Career Development Month celebrated by the National Career Development Association.

The Illinois State Board of Education, in cooperation with the Illinois Career Development Association, encourages schools and other career development providers to plan events during November to highlight this important part of Education-to-Careers.

What is Career Development?

Career Development is a lifelong process through which individuals come to understand themselves as they relate to the world of work. It occurs through participation in a continuum of developmental activities available through both formal and informal experiences in and outside of institutions and agencies. Though the terms career development, career guidance, and career counseling are often used interchangeably, they are not the same.

Career Guidance is an intervention and refers to a systematic program of counselor-coordinated information and experiences (Herr & Cramer, 1992). The ultimate goals of a career guidance program is to provide individuals with the knowledge and skills needed to develop realistic career plans and make the appropriate decisions to carry out these plans.

Career Counseling is primarily the communication that takes place between counseling professionals and their clients concerning issues of preferences, competency, achievement, self-esteem and the array of factors that facilitate or inhibit personal planning.

The Rend Lake College Career Center Satellite in conjunction with the Illinois Employment and Training Center (IETC), is designed to provide high-quality, customer-driven, universally accessible education and training services for workers, individuals looking for or needing preparation to work, students and employers. The Career Center on the Ina campus boasts 15 Internet computer stations with an array of software programs designed to assist undecided students in selecting an occupation or choosing a major. Services in the lab are free with appointments suggested.
