RLC to honor, hear national hero

The federal agent most responsible for tracking down the Oklahoma City bombing suspect will be the featured speaker Tuesday, December 8, as the 17th recipient of the Rend Lake College "Alumnus of the Year" Award at the RLC Foundation Annual Dinner.

Former Student Trustee Mark E. Michalic, a West Frankfort native, has served with distinction as a Special Agent for the U.S. Dept. of the Treasury, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms the past 14 years.

Michalic is credited with

making the computer match that first tied Timothy McVeigh, who had been stopped for driving a vehicle without a license plate, to the explosion which ripped through the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building killing 168 people in Spring, 1995.

"We got him!" Michalic yelled to a roomful of cheering agents soon after typing information into the National Crime Information Center computer at the Oklahoma City command post.



"Sheriff," he had said earlier to the head of the department where McVeigh was being detained for the traffic violation, "this is what I want you to do: Go tell that deputy to spin that old boy around and put him back in your hotel."

The public is invited to hear Michalic's story that evening at the Mt. Vernon Holiday Inn. Reservations, at \$25 per person, will be accepted through Friday, December 4, by contacting the RLC Foundation office at 437-5321, Ext. 213.

For his efforts, Michalic was cited in the March 24, 1997, issue of *Newsweek* magazine and has been presented both the ATF Distinguished Service Medal and the Attorney Generals Distinguished Service Award, from Attorney General Janet Reno.

From his colleagues with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the ATF Special Agent received the FBI Jefferson Cup with the following inscription: "To Mark E. Michalic with deep appreciation for your dedication, commitment and tireless efforts to protect the American people from crime and terrorism, and your extraordinary contributions to the cause of justice in the investigation and prosecution of the OKBOMB case. From your friends at the FBI."

McVeigh was headed to court for a bond hearing which almost certainly would have set him free when the identification was made and the call was placed to the sheriff's department.

The fact Michalic would emerge as a leader and national hero should come as no surprise to those who knew him as a Rend Lake College student majoring in Architectural Technology. In addition to being one of only two people ever to serve two years as the Student Representative on the Board of Trustees (1977-78), Michalic was vice-president of the Student Senate as a sophomore, Illinois State Lieutenant Governor of the South District for the Kiwanis-affiliated Circle K Club, Christmas "King" and a member of the tennis team.

He never gave his parents, George and Agnes Michalic of West Frankfort, much reason to worry, either, until the morning of the bombing. His office was located in the Murrah Building.

Michalic was safe, but he lost a number of friends in the blast which touched a nation.

The younger Michalic has given his medals and awards for heroic acts to his father, who was stationed at Pearl Harbor the morning of the attackby the Japanese December 7, 1941.

Michalic is a Federal Firearms Instructor responsible for training agents in the use and function of all issued weapon systems. He also is a member of the Region IV Special Response Team, a SWAT Team comprised of specially trained ATF Agents whose purpose is to serve high-risk search and arrest warrants (for example, the attempted warrant service at the Branch Davidian compound in Waco, TX, in February, 1993).

Since April, 1995, he has been a Case Agent assigned to OKBOMB (Oklahoma Bombing Task Force). That includes one year in Oklahoma City and two years in Denver, CO, on the prosecution team.

The RLC alumnus likewise has

served on numerous Secret Service protection details for Presidents Bill Clinton and George Bush, former Vice-President Dan Quayle, Admiral James Stockdale and others.

In spite of all the tributes and accolades, Michalic said he is "still in shock" regarding the RLC award "and looking forward to the banquet."

"Thank you so much for this great honor," he responded to RLC Foundation Executive Director Pat Mitchell in a recent correspondence.

Michalic's tenacity and skills which helped keep McVeigh behind bars and eventually bring McVeigh and Terry Nichols to trial, while cited nationally, might have gone unnoticed locally if not for retired Architectural Technology Instructor Fred Bruno, who notified the hometown West Frankfort Daily American.

The Annual Dinner will feature special recognition of four other individuals and two businesses; dinner entertainment by the MVTHS Symphonic String Choir, Suzuki Violist Jennifer Herzing and Vocalist Julie Wilkerson; a short video emphasizing the Children's Center and Aquatics Center and other accomplishments for 1998, and an announcement of yet another major gift award.

Metzger receives USTA national service award

Rend Lake College Women's Tennis Coach and Math Professor Diane Metzger has been selected as one of only 10 national recipients of the United States Tennis Association (USTA) Collegiate Community Service Award.

She will be honored at the Intercollegiate Tennis Association Convention December 14 in Tampa, FL.

One male and one female from NCAA I, II, III, NAIA and NJCAA schools were chosen based on several criteria, including volunteer involvement with USTA and/or community programs, work with community tennis associations, campus clinics and other campus activities and volun-

teer work running local tournaments.

Metzger, previously honored as the 1998 Southern Illinois Senior Female "Player of the Year," was sent a survey to fill out and return in order to be considered for the USTA national award. The completed survey included all of her activities and community involvement, of which there are many.

When she is not coaching the RLC Women's tennis team, she is busy with community projects.

Metzger works closely with the Benton Community Park in the organization and coordination of tennis activities in Benton, including a Juniors Team, free tennis lessons, Adult and Junior USTA-sanctioned tournaments and adult leagues. She also is secretary of the USTA Southern Illinois Tennis Association and Director of Junior Team Tennis in Southern Illinois. In addition, she has worked with the USA 1-2-3 Program in Southern Illinois and is President of the Franklin County Tennis Club.

The women's program was started four years ago by Metzger. Her teams usually represent a good blend of recent high school graduates from throughout Southern Illinois and help from nontraditional, older students Metzger has become acquainted with as a result of her own playing during the summer months.

Each of the last two years, the Lady Warriors have finished third in Region XXIV, missing a berth in the national finals by one spot.

She was hired as a full-time math instructor by Rend Lake College in August, 1984.

Of her job here at RLC Metzger says, "I've always said that something you love should be a little part of your job."

A native of Metropolis, Metzger currently resides in Benton. She has two grown children and three grand-children.

Presentations by Trammell, Metzger

Two instructors representing Rend Lake College were invited to make presentations recently for colleagues attending regional and national conferences.

Dr. Sue Trammell, who teaches biology and botany for RLC, spoke at the National Association of Biology Teachers (NABT) annual convention in Reno, NV, on November 5 with a program entitled, "Distance Education Biology Courses? It Can Be Done." The presentation illustrated how General Botany and Biology for non-majors courses can be taught via distance education utilizing laboratory kits and a minimum of equipment.

Trammell also was elected to the Nominations Committee for the Two-Year Colleges Section of NABT.

RLC Math Professor Diane Metzger made her presentation November 17 at the Illinois State Board of Education Southern Regional Education-To-Careers Conference in Marion. Her program, "Developing Real World Math Problems," focused on curriculum development for Grades 1-14 based on local business and industry needs.

The development of Metzger's presentation contained several aspects initiated after representatives from Business/Industry in Southern Illinois presented real-world math problems on October 21, 1997, to a group of elementary, high school and college teachers.

Participants volunteered to stay afterward to discuss developing problems that could be used in the classroom related to the applications presented. Dr. Leno Petrotti, from the Center of Occupational Research Development, then took those examples and worked on the process to be followed in developing these problems.

The second part required a group of teachers from the previous work-

shop to meet as a team a year ago to review the real-world math problems and to develop math problems by grade level, related to them.

The goal of this session was to develop 50 problems and 25 labs for each grade level individually and as a group within one month's time. The group was named "Math Curriculum Design Team for Developing Real World Math Problems." Metzger was one of 10 people participating on the design team.

The design team then sent the problems to Pedrotti, who reviewed the problems and offered suggestions and corrections. On February 6, in a VTEL Conference with Pedrotti, the design team followed up on the problems and comments made, continuing to develop and revise problems.

Finally, this past summer, the design team again toured businesses and industries in Southern Illinois with the hopes of developing more ideas for real-world math problems with Pedrotti and preparing the final publication.

The Rend Lake College Foundation is sponsoring a Beanie Baby Raffle to benefit the Nursing Scholarship Fund.



RLC class helps Ewing network

Service Learning is an educational concept that involves applying skills acquired in the classroom to benefit the community. At least six such courses will be included on the Spring schedule at Rend Lake College.

The theory behind this alternative is sound and makes perfect sense.

In reality, however, many Rend Lake College classes have practiced "service learning" for some time now.

Students in Ricky Robinson's Industrial Electronics class, "Introduction to Networks," did not need a "Service Learning" designation to send out invitations to in-district schools to take advantage of their newly learned skills.

"They extended the offer to any school in the area that had a computer lab where help was needed to get the equipment configured and get the network up and running," Department Chair William Dill said.

Ewing-Northern Grade School apparently considered the offer too good to pass up, especially since one of its own, Regina Houseworth, is a member of the RLC networking class.

Robinson and 11 of his students spent one evening class recently installing networking software on about 30 computers at Ewing-Northern.

"It was good experience for the class members because not all of the computers installed properly the first time. The students got to see what actually takes place during the installation process, and not just what is supposed to happen," Robinson said.

"It's a big help to the school, plus it's hands-on, practical experience in the 'real' world for our students. It's definitely a win-win situation for everyone concerned," added Dill.

Class members include three fulltime teachers who wanted to learn about networking, as well as three engineers and one technician from General Tire, another technician and one high school student.

Rend Lake College currently has 181 traditional and non-traditional Pinckneyville graduates attending on-campus classes, according to the Admissions and Records office.

The three main goals of the meeting were to encourage better public relations between the Pinckneyville community and the college, to encourage PCHS graduates to explore Rend Lake College as a viable college choice and to promote involvement within the community and raise awareness for what the local community college has to offer the community at large.

And fourth, two RLC Foundation Board members from the Pinckneyville area, Dr. Gene Stotlar and Dr. Charles (Bill) Roe, have been working diligently to spur community involvement with Rend Lake College.

The group toured the Aquatics Center, Career Center, Children's Center, the restored, one-room Independence Schoolhouse and other labs and areas of interest on campus.


NationsBank of Franklin and Jefferson counties combined have donated over \$27,000 which has been given toward student scholarships or the sponsoring of special events.

College consortium will take over troubled MCC

Name, director, staff will change

The beleaguered Metropolitan Community College in East St. Louis will be taken over by a consortium of community colleges and the Southern Illinois University system, the Illinois Community College Board announced Monday.

And the school is being given a new name — East St. Louis Community College Center.

The board took over Metropolitan Community College in May and on Oct. 16 said the college would be dissolved by year's end. It cited the failure of the administration to turn in an audit, inflated See College, Page A7

enrollment figures, lack of financial controls, missing inventory and lack of adequate tax and population bases.

The board put out proposals for other schools to provide services to the college. Contracts with the cooperating schools will be signed within the next few weeks. Don Wilske, director for system finances for the board, said financial details were still being worked out.

Asked why the board is pressing ahead with the change while the school's trustees are trying to keep the college locally run, Wilske noted that the board already has decided to terminate the college. "The decision stands until it's changed. ... at this point, it would be premature to assume the board will change the decision," he said.

The administration and operation of the two-year college will be taken over Jan. 1 by a group called the Southern Illinois Collegiate Common Market. It was organized in 1973 to provide health care programs and includes John A. Logan College, Rend Lake College, Shawnee Community College, Southeastern Illinois College and Southern Illinois Universities at Carbondale and Edwardsville.

The consortium will contract with other schools and entities to provide educational programs, the board said. This will include Belleville Area College, to provide occupational, adult basic and secondary education, developmental, and business training courses.

Shawnee Community College will provide courses for nurse assistant, addiction counseling, and truck driving certification. Lakeland College will provide classes at the Southwest Illinois Correctional Center. Kaskaskia College will offer classes in child care.

Most classes will be held on the campus of the dissolved college, and credits from the school will be transferable. Students may also enroll at any of the BAC campuses or extension sites, or at neighboring community colleges at in-district rates. A new director and staff will be named and student workers hired.
